REFLECTION

"NO QUESTIONS ASKED ...?"

On this *Good Shepherd Sunday*, it would be all too easy for us to leave church...hoodwinked. The Gospel for this 4th Sunday of Easter uses the parable told by Jesus of the shepherd who cares beyond obvious reason for the flock in his charge. Using that image, Jesus even speaks of his own willingness to lay down his life... *'for the sheep'*. It is a picture of benign all-embracing care for creatures who seem to bear little responsibility but to take it all for granted. It is *comforting*...and it is *cosy*. It is just far too...*cosy*!

I must confess that I have often been complicit in encouraging this somewhat simplistic impression in sermons on this liturgical day. Too often I have used one of my (now adult!) children's woolly lambs in the pulpit...supposedly as a visual aid to push the message of such blinkered assurance being available to us all as Christians...no questions asked. 'Lamby' (as my visual aid was imaginatively called) was precious to one of my children in particular...and it helped her to sleep at night.

In my bath on a Sunday morning (an image I wouldn't encourage you to dwell upon) I often listen to *Sunday Worship* on Radio 4. Being our nation's public service broadcaster, the BBC tries to be 'all things to all men' by varying the styles of worship it broadcasts each week at 8.00 am. Two Sundays ago, it was different...in a *different* way.

It was marking the 30th anniversary of the Rwandan Genocide, and the worship that day was in the context of stories that came from that appalling time in their country's history. In many instances, it was also an account of what some Christians did to other Christians. It did not help me sleep that night; but it did remind me of the great responsibility that accompanies us when we make the Easter proclamation in good faith:

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!
