## REFLECTION

Ah – the dreaded curse of Isaiah again, a theme that runs right through scripture. If you've struggled to communicate your knowledge and love of God to people who are dear to you but they just don't get it - the joy and glory of it - how well you'll understand the frustrations of Isaiah, Paul and Jesus himself!

After Isaiah's vision, he understands God to pronounce a curse on those in Israel who reject him: they will hear but not *understand*, see, but they won't *perceive*. Mark Vernon's recent book, *The Secret History of Christianity* – is really about the development of human consciousness – and the final idea is about the way we need to be alive to the way our hearts perceive God through the imagination. Not imagination as in 'fantasy', but as in the way a lithe and living heart discovers *meaning* from what the mind admits as 'data'. Those whom Jesus was able to heal in his home town will have been that faithful few Isaiah anticipates – a 'tenth' – not the majority with 'fat hearts' and 'heavy ears' who shut their eyes.

Does God really curse people to make them so unresponsive in this way? Or is it Isaiah's way of explaining to himself the inexplicable - humanity's rejection of God? Either way, references to these 'fat hearts' abound in the New Testament writings. The rejection of Jesus by his own people is just a repeat of the prophets' experiences. They suffered the same rejection. 'Twas ever thus.

So eternal life can't be taught – only caught, as they say, and the gospel isn't moral teaching, still less Christian doctrine. It's new life experienced within, or it's nothing.

For most of us, dealing with the intricacies of family life, health, our parish church, our community, most of the time, our hearts are distracted by practicalities. That's one reason why so many of Paul's letters are dull and fractious. The Church of England's General Synod's business at the moment is necessary, but no one would suggest that it conveys Jesus's promised life in abundance. That's what you *live*, always as a gift and surprise, when you're singing a hymn in church, gazing at the sea or at a statue, reading a poem, praying with someone close to what we call death. That's the life that catches you up into paradise and makes the besetting thorns in your flesh bearable.
