## REFLECTION

Today's readings: Isaiah 35:3-6; Acts 16:6-12a; Luke 10:1-9

Today we celebrate the life of St. Luke, Gospel writer and Evangelist. He was a Greek, a scholar, a physician and a close companion of Paul, with whom he is thought to have travelled widely as the early Church grew. From the beginning of both his Gospel and the Book of Acts it is clear that he had 'carefully investigated' eye witness accounts of Jesus' ministry, his death, resurrection and ascension into heaven. He documents the explosive growth of the early church including Peter's and Paul's ministries. It is clear that he wrote as someone who wanted people to realise the critical importance of knowing Jesus and following him and that salvation is for all, regardless of gender, social position or nationality.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus commissions a group of 72 people, in pairs, to go out into towns and villages ahead of him to proclaim to the people that 'the Kingdom of God is near.' There's a sense of urgency and priority to proclaim the message and heal the sick in Jesus' commission. They are to go without support and rely on those they encounter who respond to their message. They do as they are charged and, in the verses following on from today's reading, Luke records them returning to Jesus rejoicing in what they had experienced. They had seen hints of the final Kingdom in which God establishes his justice and destroys all evil, like the picture presented in our reading from the Book of Isaiah.

These words of Luke remind us of the need to proclaim our faith. We are not all called to be evangelists, but we are all called to be witnesses, to be ambassadors for Christ, sharing our story of faith with others sensitively and appropriately. In our daily lives we can, by what we say and how we live, be true to our calling. We can be 'salt and light' in a world that can be rotten and dark. Being silent and doing nothing is not an option, if we are to be faithful disciples and if we are to experience more of God's Kingdom come among us.
