REFLECTION

Deuteronomy 26:1-11 Philippians 4:4-9 John 6:25-35

It's the Harvest Festival season, which, in Swanage and Studland lasts a whole month. If it's not Harvest in your church this week, don't worry, it recently has been/will be soon.

Harvest Festival is unique, because it is celebrated by people of all faiths and none. Whether we recognise God as the provider of the Harvest, or not, there is a desire to celebrate the fruits of the earth.

The Bible encourages us to celebrate the good things which God gives us, but it adds a distinctively Christian reminder that there is more to life than food and drink.

- In Matthew chapter. 6 Jesus reminds us: "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?"
- In John chapter 6 he goes even further: "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."
- In the Old Testament Harvest instructions, recorded in Deuteronomy 26, the command is to celebrate the Harvest with a basket of produce and a remembrance of God's wider blessing on His people.

Christians are called to recognise that God gives us the wonderful gifts of the earth in order to free us to serve him. We are called to use them wisely and with care. Harvest is not an end in itself, it is God's provision for the journey of a life in his service.

If we want a Biblical Harvest challenge, Deuteronomy 26 gives us one: "Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you." As God's people, we are called to welcome the refugees, asylum seekers, and the people on small boats. He gives us his good gifts, and expects us to share these gifts with them.
